1. Introduction:

- 1.1 Construction sites are a place of adventure and thieves looking to steal plant and equipment. Therefore, that sites are made secure in order to protect the materials. Visitors should not be as aware of the dangers of a construction site.

2. Main Points:

- 2.1 The law effectively states that visitors should not expect to be put at risk if they enter a construction site. The law applies to children.
- 2.2 Visitors are entitled to be safe and they should not be exposed to risk when on a construction site.
- 2.3 Site security should be maintained without authorisation and without having to clearly commit trespass.

3. Points to remember

- 3.1 Sites should be fenced and access points should be displayed. Entry to the construction site and that entry is prohibited.
- 3.2 Plant and equipment should be stored out of sight where practicable and disabled/secured where practicable.
- 3.3 Never leave keys in the car.
- 3.4 Hazardous substances should be readily familiar to site employees and can pose a serious risk to those who have not encountered them before. Lock them away.
- 3.5 Consider methods of access control upon the scale and type of site. (This may comprise of a manned gate or a signpost to report to the site manager, or could be a manned gate or a signpost. This may also provide a method of access control.)
- 3.6 Remove ladders from the site at the end of each working day.
- 3.7 Whilst trespassers, visitors should be challenged and either escorted off site or reported to the site manager, avoid putting yourself in a position where you are at fault.
